


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Raising My Rainbow: Adventures In Raising A Fabulous, Gender Creative Son



Synopsis

Raising My Rainbow is Lori Duron's frank, heartfelt, and brutally funny account of her and her family's adventures of distress and happiness raising a gender-creative son. Whereas her older son, Chase, is a Lego-loving, sports-playing boy's boy, Lori's younger son, C.J., would much rather twirl around in a pink sparkly tutu, with a Disney Princess in each hand while singing Lady Gaga's "Paparazzi." C.J. is gender variant or gender nonconforming, whichever you prefer. Whatever the term, Lori has a boy who likes girl stuff—really likes girl stuff. He floats on the gender-variation spectrum from super-macho-masculine on the left all the way to super-girly-feminine on the right. He's not all pink and not all blue. He's a muddled mess or a rainbow creation. Lori and her family choose to see the rainbow. I received the book yesterday and just finished it. The story is more than just the challenges that this family has faced...it is a call to parents everywhere to really allow their children to be who they are. So often as parents, in an effort to minimize social pressures or teasing, we advise our children on how to hide...rather than celebrate...who they are. This goes for me...with embarrassment, I realize the times I may have unknowingly prejudged a child who does not fit a particular mold, or the times I

may not have been as accepting of my own childrens' quirks or differences from me. I do not have gender non-conforming children, but I realize my bias towards my sons when they may want to color something pink or want to get another stuffed animal. Why should I squelch what they embrace? Whether you agree - or not- with the way C.J. Is being raised, you will find an inspirational and sometimes heartbreaking story of raising a child to be who he/she is, regardless of societal expectations. The journey of the family is very touching, and the parental development is as intriguing as they are. Not a hippie book. Definitely one to help us all learn to break through boundaries and accept and love one another, as we were intended.

This book shares the author's personal family stories as two sons grow up from birth to kindergarten and fourth grade. As he grows, and starting very young, the younger boy expresses his choices to play with dolls, wear skirts and go for the pink aisles in toy stores. How they all learn to handle this unexpected situation, and the comments, looks and judgements of almost everyone, makes for fascinating reading and insightful learning. I delayed my plans for my day and just kept reading. I am a mental health counselor and have some specific clients who will benefit from reading this and talking about it with family members and me as well. Teachers, parents, family and friends of gender-creative children will enjoy the presentation of this material, and benefit from the consistent encouragement to be open minded and open hearted. I especially enjoyed reading about Chase, the older brother, and CJ, the younger brother, and the relationship they share as siblings. The author has taken her own experience of being a sibling to a gay brother, and now having two sons dealing in their own unique ways with gender identity issues, and written a great read, fun, informative, and I will be checking out her blog now to continue to wish this little family the best today and as they all grow.

I am not a parent (in my 60's - by choice), but as I read this lovely piece of work - I cried, laughed my butt off, and had every emotion I could imagine a parent would have. I held my breath more than a dozen times, I was scared, terrified, happy, and elated. It made me, revisit, the honest sincerity of children -- no hatred -- just pure love. This book should have made us realize how quickly we lose so much of your innocence. I commend the strength and commitment of this family to recognize this beautiful human being and respect his 'needs'. I am not quite 1/2 way through the book, but felt so compelled to write a quick review - as I see it, at this point. This young boy's story has - resurrected my belief in ones' individuality. We become so hardened as we age. Do not hesitate to load this book (or pick it up), ASAP. You'll not want to put it down. It will hold you attention from the 1st sentence.

I laughed, I cried and I felt joy and fear right along with Lori as she chronicled her journey through raising a gender-creative child. As a mom of two delightful boys myself, one being gender-creative, many of the situations she wrote about I also experienced myself. It was interesting and extremely helpful to read her point of view - I started making a few changes to my approach as a result of this book. Lori Duron's *Raising My Rainbow* is an excellent and important read that leaves the reader questioning their way of thinking about tolerance, acceptance, unconditional love, agape. What does a parent do when expectations are shattered, when the nature of their child brings bullying and hateful behavior? Duron walks the reader through the answer with painful poise; she writes intelligently, humorously, with sharp authentic sarcasm that resonates as if ones own inner voice. The words on the page and the spaces between the sentences clearly paint the image of what it is to give birth to a nonconforming child, the anxiety over wanting to keep her children safe, the fear engendered over wanting to protect CJ and his brother Chase from bullying and hatred. Through Duron we see that different is not bad, not evil, but just different. It is the light of her love that shines through on the page and makes this a compelling read. Her story, CJ's life, is our story, what it is to be human, vulnerable, open, raw, and face life without compromise. We suffer along through the consequences of taking on the bullies and hate mongers. Hours after I shut the last page, images of Duron's son, CJ, laughing and romping happily in a skirt, playing with his Barbie doll, still run through my mind and I can't help but think that were it not for the love, the unconditional love, of his mother and father, there may be no laughing at all.
