




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How They Decorated: Inspiration From Great Women Of The Twentieth Century

Some worked closely with decorating legends such as John Fowler, Albert Hadley, Billy Baldwin, Syrie Maugham, and Jean-Michel Frank. Others took to the task of decorating single-handedly like Pauline Trigère, Sybil Connolly, Vita Sackville-West, and Fleur Cowles. "How They Decorated: Inspiration from Great Women of the Twentieth Century" opens with a brief quote from Gloria Vanderbilt-- "Decorating is autobiography"-- and this new volume from Rizzoli is far from the first to link interior decor to the personal styles and biographies of famous women. To be sure, however, it is one of the best of books in this genre. And, with each chapter providing a perfectly rounded stand-alone portrait, it is an ideal book for picking up and putting down, inviting repeated visits. Every one of the women featured in "How They Decorated" is now deceased, and so some photographs of their residences may well be familiar to devotees of shelter magazines. No matter: the beauty of the photographs and the excellence of their captions makes this a most visually stunning and captivating book. The 16 women featured in the book are drawn from the worlds of interior decor, fashion design, visual arts, diplomacy, aristocracy, and considerable wealth. Hailing from the two sides of the Atlantic, they include Lady Diana Cooper, Evangeline Bruce, Louise de Vilmorin, Helene Rochas, Gabrielle van Zuylen, Mona von Bismarck, Pauline de Rothschild, Babe Paley, Elsa Schiaparelli, Fleur Cowles, Pauline Trigere, Bunny Mellon, Dominique de Menil, Georgia O'Keeffe, and Lesley Blanch. A strong sense of personal style is common to all of these women, but there is enough variation in their home decor to provide a varied garden of reading delights.
